Clergy Education and Training Fund. Those seeking to undertake the work of the Church in Shrewsbury Diocese have many training needs. Candidates accepted for priestly formation spend around 6 years at a Seminary. Whilst the time in Seminary helps the student to determine God's will for him, it is also designed to provide experiences so that the student can play a full role in parish community life following Ordination. Training is also undertaken by those men wishing to become Permanent Deacons in Parishes in the Diocese. As in most occupations, learning and education is a life-long process, and Priests and Deacons have ongoing training needs in their ministries. However, training for Seminarians, Deacons and Clergy involves considerable expense, and the Clergy Education & Training Fund seeks to help meet these costs. At a time of shortages of Priests, it is a blessing that we have men studying for the Priesthood and Diaconate. This is good news for the people of the Diocese, but the training is expensive – for example, it costs around £30,000 a year (about £80 a day) to train a Seminarian, and £4,000 a year to train a Deacon. The Clergy Education & Training Fund helps meet these costs, the ongoing training needs of Clergy, and in certain instances the cost of training Laity (such as Eucharistic Ministers). THE WORD

Year A + 12 November 2023 + Paalter Week 4



Jewish wedding ceremonies in the time of Jesus began in the evening. The families and guests formed a procession to accompany the couple from the bride's family home to her new home with her husband's family. As they drew near, the women members of the groom's family formed a torch-lit procession of welcome.

In the parable in today's Gospel, ten girls were to form this procession but only five had thought of bringing oil, so the procession was unlikely to be a resounding success. The wedding suffers another setback: there is a delay in getting proceedings under way, and the girls get tired and fall asleep. Suddenly, towards midnight, word comes that the procession is finally on its way. There is a frantic flurry of activity as the girls form their procession, only to discover that half of the lamps won't light. If they try to stretch out the oil supply enough for five lamps to provide for twice that number, there is every danger the procession will be plunged into darkness after a few minutes. If that happened, the couple and their families would be the laughing stock of the neighbourhood. Instead, the five are sent off to find an oil shop, an unlikely prospect so late at night.

Despite these rather chaotic beginnings, the wedding gets underway. When the five girts return from their frantic shopping expedition, the groom refuses to open the door to them, saying he does not know them.

For Matthew, wedding banquets are an image of the kingdom of heaven. What he is saying is that we do not know when the Messiah will return, any more than the girls knew when the bridegroom would come. The girls represent the Christian community waiting for the Messiah's return. Matthew divides them into 'wise and foolish.' He is using them to make one of his favourite points. The time between the resurrection and the return of the Son of Man is not 'empty time.' It is an opportunity for the followers of Jesus to prove they are his genuine disciples by devoting themselves to good works. That time is now. Like the wise bridesmaids, we must stand ready, with our lamps lit. We must not be caught unprepared.

"Lord, help me to be ever prepared for your coming. Amen."

PRAY

Today's first reading speaks of the importance of wisdom. Pray for the gift of wisdom, so that you will know what is truly important and what is not.

LEARN

The Christian must be ready for the Messiah when he comes in judgement at the end of time. If he does not find us ready, all he can say to us is "I do not know you." Like the wise bridesmaids, we must be faithful witnesses to our vocation, people who live by Christian values of justice, peace and love.

DO

Make an examination of conscience. Are you living in such a way that you are ready to meet the Lord whenever he calls you?

REFLECT

n November 1962, Pope John XXIII received some very bad news. His doctors informed him that he had cancer and that it was inoperable. He had only a few months left to live.

It must have come as a tremendous disappointment to Pope John because there was still so much he wanted to do. Only a few weeks before, he had opened the first session of the Second Vatican Council, the great meeting of the world's bishops that he had summoned to examine Church teaching and practice and consider the Church's place in the world. Now, he knew he wouldn't be around to guide the Council

or to witness its conclusions. He would be gone before its vital work would be finished. But Pope John's response displayed none of that disappointment or any anxiety about the prospect of death. "A tumour," he replied. "Very well, let God's will be done. But don't worry about me because my bags are packed. I'm ready to go." And there's no doubt that his bags were packed and he was ready to go.

In the Gospel story, the five foolish bridesmaids allowed the oil in their lamps to run out. The wedding was delayed and they hadn't brought enough oil to keep their lamps lit, unlike the five wise bridesmaids who had brought sufficient oil. When the ceremony eventually got under way, the foolish ones were not allowed to participate in the celebration; they were left outside the door.

The ten bridesmaids represent us - the Christian community - waiting for the Messiah's return. Some are wise and some are foolish; some are prepared for his coming and some are not, some have their lamps lit, others have not. The point is that, like the wise bridesmaids, we must be always prepared, alert, ready for when the bridegroom will come. Like Good Pope John, we must have our bags packed, our lamps lit, for we do not know the day or the hour.

Who we are.

LOUDfence began as a pro healing and reconciliation movement by Antonia Sobocki in the UK in 2020. It is inspired by Gospel values and aims to work with churches to actively foster a culture which is prosafeguarding and truth telling. LOUDfence celebrates what we want to be. We are all called to care for and support those who have been injured by abuse directly or indirectly. Supporting those who wish to reclaim the practice of their faith is a form of restorative justice.

LOUDfence is a community activity of solidarity and support with abuse victims and survivors. It empowers parishioners and enables them to be part of the solution by giving them an avenue to express their feelings. To safeguard is to live out the values of the Gospel in their most literal sense.

Antonia (LOUDfence UK Director) said:

"As a survivor of familial child abuse, the church did exactly what it should have done. It loved, valued, included, and nurtured me. I think it would be no exaggeration to say the church became a kind of replacement family for me and I have always loved the church for how it has helped me. It is for this reason I work in Catholic activism".

"There have been serious safeguarding failings in the past, but I know that when the church gets it right, it can get it spectacularly right. This requires all of us to work together for that church we all love and value so much."

What is LOUDfence.

LOUDfence is an event where ribbons of all colours and styles are displayed as a visible act of solidarity which enables people to send and receive messages of care and support. The aim of LOUDfence is to give survivors, the entire church and wider society a voice.

It is important to remember LOUDfence is a celebration of survivor's courage and the empowerment and inclusion of the entire parish. It is our experience that LOUDfence is an opportunity for healing, understanding and the beginning of dialogue. It is a visible signal of support to those who have been wounded, marginalised, and excluded.

LOUDfence enables the beginning of a process of culture change within the church. We do this by celebrating what we want to be and by celebrating the virtue of protecting others by speaking out about our safeguarding concerns. Also, by supporting survivors and actively seeking to turn safeguarding into an act or primary evangelisation by example.
