THE WORD

Year B + 17 December 2023 - Faalter Week 3

SECOND FIDDLE JOHN 1:6-8. 19-28

'You're so vain,' declares Carly Simon in her famous song of that title. She doesn't say who it's about, but were she singing it today, there would be no shortage of candidates. We live in the age of celebrity, of the selfie and the social media influencer.

The cult of celebrity is huge. Reality TV thrives on people's desperate desire to become famous. It has made celebrities of people we would never have heard of otherwise.

Some years ago the owner of the cosmetics company, L'Oreal died. Liliane Bettencourt was one of the richest people on earth, made rich in part by one of the most successful advertising campaigns ever launched. L'Oreal use celebrities to front their campaigns using the slogan we are all familiar with: "Because you're worth it." Use their product because you're worth it. Spoil yourself because you're worth it. You deserve the best because you're worth it.

It's no surprise the slogan has had such a big impact, because it's part of human nature to focus on ourselves, to think only or primarily about ourselves. In many ways, it's the dominant mindset of our modern culture. It's why so many people endure all kinds of trials on shows like 'I'm a celebrity...' in order to become more famous or resurrect flagging careers.

Taking part in Tm a celebrity...' wouldn't have bothered the star of today's Gospel, John the Baptist. John lived in the desert. He dressed in camel skin and survived on locusts and wild honey. Those maggots and creepy crawlies the so-called celebrities squirm over would have been a normal breakfast for him. He looked the type that even Conor McGregor would be loathe to encounter in a well-lit alleyway.

And yet, people flocked to him from all over. They were impressed by his message of repentance. They got baptised by him.

It must have been tempting for John to feel like a celebrity, a kind of messiah. All these people were coming from far and wide to see him, hear him, be baptised by him, this wild, desert prophet. The temptation to be vain, to think, 'It's all about me' must have been tremendous but he resists. John is at pains to push the focus away from himself. He doesn't want to be the centre of attention. He knows he is only a messenger. He says. 'Someone is coming after me who is greater than I am, and I'm not fit to undo the strap of his sandals.' Here is his chance to become a celebrity, but John points away from himself, towards Jesus. He is saying, 'It's not about me - it's about John points away from himself, towards Jesus. He is saying, 'It's secondary importance and that Jesus, the one he witnesses to, is of primary importance.


So it must be with us also. As Christians, our focus must always be on Jesus.

REFLECT

The first is about humility. When you think about it, we have every reason to be humble. We did not tring ourselves into existence. Every 'good' we have is a gift, either directly from God, or indirectly by means of those who came before us. We cannot restore our youth (no matter how much botox or plastic surgery we use). We can't get rid of osteoporosis if it bites into us. We can't make ourselves or our ilves look perfect. We cannot prevent our own deaths. and give ourselves the gift of eternal life. We can't stop our loved ones dying.

Humility is recognising our smallness before God. We can only be humble and only form right relationships with others when we cease making all our actions revolve around ourselves.

Second, what John the Baptiser is telling us, and what Advent tells us, is that, as Christians, our primary focus must be on Jesus. As Christians, it can never be all about me - it must be all about Jesus, following Jesus, pointing to Jesus. Yes,



That's our challenge this season and always. How effectively do you point others towards Jesus? For us Christians, it must be all about Jesus. Because he's worth it.



DO

Think about how you witness to Jesus. Are you happy to let others know that you are his follower?

PRAY

For many people in financial distress, the lead up to Christmas is especially difficult. Pray for those who are finding it hard to hold onto hope this Advent.

SAY

Lord, help me to be an effective witness to you. Amen.

LEARN

The Third Sunday of Advent is known as Gaudete Sunday. The Latin word gaudete means "rejoicef" and since the Mass begins with the words of Saint Paul – "Rejoice in the Lord always: again I will say, rejoice" (Philippians 4:4) – this Sunday came to be known as Gaudete Sunday. On this Sunday the liturgical colour is rosa, symbolising the anticipated joy of Christmas breaking into the more penitential Advent Season.

ENTRANCE ANTIPHON

Rejoice in the Lord always: again I say, rejoice. Indeed, the Lord is near.

COLLECT

O God, who see how your people faithfully await the feast of the Lord's Nativity. enable us, we pray, to attain the joys of so great a salvation and to celebrate them always with solemn worship and glad rejoicing. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit.

one God, for ever and ever. Amen.


