

4th, 11th and 18th March at 7.00pm



The Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists reset the Doomsday Clock on the 23rd January and it is still 90 seconds to midnight.

Whilst the clock remains at the same time as 2023 they warned that their decision: '...... should not be taken as a sign that the international security situation has eased. Instead, leaders and citizens around the world should take this statement as a stark warning and respond urgently, as if today were the most dangerous moment in modern history. Because it may well be.

In their 2024 Doomsday Clock Statement, the Bulletin's Science and Security Board raises four areas of concern: The many dimensions of nuclear threat, an ominous climate change outlook, evolving biological threats and the dangers of AI.

On Nuclear Weapons the statement talks of 'an undiminished nuclear threat and a new arms race': 'The last year was characterized by fraught relations among the world's great powers, who were engaged in vigorous nuclear modernization programs as the nuclear arms control regime continued to collapse. Within this general context, the contours of a peaceful and sustainable ending of Russia's war against Ukraine are difficult to discern, and concerns remain about Russia's possible use of nuclear weapons in this conflict'

On AI, the warning is of the accelerating military uses of AI: 'Extensive use of AI is already occurring in intelligence, surveillance, reconnaissance, simulation, and training. Of particular concern are lethal autonomous weapons, which identify and destroy targets without human intervention. Decisions to put AI in control of important physical systems—in particular, nuclear weapons—could indeed pose a direct existential threat to humanity.'

And yet there is still time to turn the clock back.

Report on NJPN Open Networking Day on Saturday 24 February on zoom



Marian Thompson writes: It was an interesting meeting with 40 + participants from all over the country. There were 4 main speakers and a chance to have our say in breakout groups.

Michael Chambers of Brentwood Diocese told us about his research with young people in schools ages 8 -18 and some others over 18. He asked them the questions 'How do you feel about the Cimate Crisis? How does it affect you or the people around you? What is your vision for what needs to be done? How well do you feel the government is responding? What can NJPN do? (The first 4 questions are suggested by Greenpeace as introductions for their 'climate voter' door knockers (see page 7). Michael had chosen some of the most interesting replies in which many were calling for stronger more effective action from the government. He also sensed there was a general feeling amomng young people they were not being heard and listened to.

Ellen Teague of the Columban Justice, Peace and Ecology Team looked at 'Environmental Justice' .

She started describing the "No Faith In Fossil Fuels" 240 hour vigil outside the Palace of Westminster that started on Ash Wednesday and ran for ten days. Christians of all persuasions took part, some coming at a set time on a rota basis and others just turning up to join in. They were calling the government to take bold action:

To move away from oil and gas;

To pay reparations to countries whose people usually, the poorest, are already suffering the severe affects of climate change To invest much more in green energy.

Various people came out to see and maybe discuss. One person in particular commented that die back of groups of people, the poor people, was part of life. This collateral damage from climate change was inevitable. Such approach is the opposite of the Christian approach that God loves and cares about everyone of us. Later in the NJPN day it was referred to as 'die back of the vulnerable'.

Ellen went on to remind us of Laudate Deum v 58 'we are being more heard but not maybe fast enough'.

Some people now suggest that fossil fuel companies are moving away from fossil fuels, but Ellen insisted they are NOT. They use words like 'climate change', 'transition', 'emissions' and 'low carbon energy' in their annual reporting but this greenwash. According to research between 2009 and 2020 Exxonmobile generated no electricity from clean energy sources, Chevron generated just 65.5 megawatts. BP generated the most with around 2,000 megawatts which is the equivalent to two large gas fired power stations. Systemic change is needed in the economic and energy system as well as our individual actions.

What can we do now?

- i. Call for Catholic Dioceses to divest from fossil fuels. Dioceses that have already are: Arundel and Brighton, Birmingham, Brentwood, Hallam, Hexham and Newcastle, Leeds, Lancaster, Middlesborough, Nottingham, Portsmouth, Southark, Salford. All these have promised not to invest in fossil fuels in future. Westminster has disinvested but not made this promise. Dioceses that still invest in fossil fuells are Cardiff, Clifton, East Anglia, Menevia, Liverpool, Nottingham, Plymouth, Shrewsbury and Wrexham. Ellen commented that those who live in these Diocese still have work to do.
- ii. Boycott banks funding fossil fuels...Barclays and HSBC are the worst in UK
- iii. Be prepared to work with other groups Christian and secular. You can learn from them. Look at Tearfund's 'Have you lost your Voice' campaign and send a letter to Steve Barclay MP, Secretary of State for Environment (DEFRA), https://www.tearfund.org/campaigns/rubbish-campaign/send-a-lemon
- iv. Notice and appreciate God's creation around you. Remember the indigenous peoples, envoironmental defenders, who have much more to loose than us, risk their lives when they try to protect vulnerable communities, water and biodiversity from destructive activities.

 Finally **REMAIN HOPEFUL**.

Andrew Jackson, Chief Executive of Pax Christi England and Wales, spoke on 'Environmental issues as a cause of conflict'.

He started by asking which will annihilate us first- climate change or nuclear war? He suggested that both issues are interconnected and part of the same whole.

Climate change causes conflict because it intensifies competition over land and water, affects food production, and forces migration. Paragraph 57 of 'Laudato Si' says, "It is foreseeable that once certain resources have been depleted, the scene will be set for new wars." Where there is already tension, climate change exacerbates it for instance in conflict of between pastoral cultures and large scale farmers.

War and violent conflict damage the environment and cause widespread damage to buildings and infrastructure. Andrew showed pictures of the burning of oil fields in Kuwait as the Iraqui army retreated in 1991.

He suggested that the environment is the silent victim of conflict as we are seeing today in Ukraine and Gaza. He referred to Emily Anthes's article 'The Silent Victim- environmental impact on Ukraine' https://www.theguardian.com/world/2023/feb/20/ukraine-war-cost-for-nature-russia.

Andrew pointed out that military greenhouse gas emissions are around 5.5% of total global emissions but they do not get included by any countries in their net zero carbon targets. There was a move to include these at COP 28 but it was not taken up. Something to be addressed at the COP this year?

Colette Joyce of Westminster Justice and Peace Commission and Coordinator of the Southern Dioceses Environmental Network started her presentation with a photo of Westminster Cathedral taken through the branches of a London Plane tree in the piazza. How many have barely noticed the London Plane trees outside the cathedral? There is a need for greater appreciation of and engagement with the natural world around us and for personal carbon reduction. But she stressed her belief in collective action and systemic change. Colette is working with Westminster Diocese for carbon neutrality by 2030

LENT PRACTICES OF LAUDATO SI' ANIMATORS

V. Bell for the Laudato Si' Animators UK writes: Lent begins on 14th February this year, until 28th March.

My daughter, a very orthodox Catholic, and I have a difference of opinion about what are the best kinds of penances in Lent. She agrees with the traditional idea of temporarily giving up something one enjoys. I feel that this is a wasted opportunity. My daughter argues, as does the Church, that it strengthens one's will power as well as makes an offering to God. My choice is to give up something that one should not be consuming, getting into the habit of doing without it during Lent, then continuing without it after Lent. Or start doing something that you should be doing, and keep on after Lent.

This regular discussion with my daughter came about again this year, and caused me to wonder what were the thoughts of my fellow Animators concerning Lent. Did they have views about what people could or should be doing? If penance, what sort of penance? If resolutions, what sort of resolutions? Is it time to bring something new to Lent, or are the traditional actions the best? The Animators are people, mainly Catholics, who have been trained by the Vatican-backed Laudato Si' Movement to inform and inspire others to engage in dialogue and action on the current environmental crises. I think my favourite option for living Lent, given the massive over-consumption that the world is drowning under, is to buy nothing at all that isn't essential. And if we carried that on after Lent, what a success!

Having garnered views from the Animators, I find that Anita shares my antipathy for over-consumption, and recommends that we don't buy more than we need. She has joined her parish's project of a community garden where they grow food for themselves! Clare, while appreciating the positive sacrifice of buying nothing, prefers "to do something extra, something which has often become a part of my everyday life". One example she gives is 'Meditation Monday', the aim of which is to manage stress, improve mood and find peace in one's daily life. Another extra she does is a 'Lenten Pilgrimage, where local people are invited to attend a different denominational church each Sunday afternoon'.

John likes to do a variety of positive things, so he joins ecumenical Lent groups and reads daily spiritual writings. To add to the variety, he also gives up alcohol. But he feels that the best thing would be to do practical action and outreach, such as helping refugees.

Geraldine is not so keen on "sudden, major change". She feels that slow, gradual change suits some people better, despite her having successfully given up things permanently after giving them up during Lent - sugar for example. She would encourage both sacrificial penance and doing something extra.

Susan believes that Lent is a good time "to examine our lifestyles and change our hearts so that love for God's creation is expanded". Especially, she says, to consider how ethical the products we buy are.

The Animators are agreed on restraint in buying being a good commitment for Lent, and Kevin adds that he tries not to buy anything new at all, reminding us that plenty of items, especially clothes, are available 'pre-loved'. Along with other Animators, he also likes to give something up – Guinness in his case - and to add spiritual activity, like going to Mass as much as possible.

Menchu is all for not buying anything unnecessary in Lent, and also for continuing the habit permanently. The Ignatian Solidarity Network has a Lenten No-Buy Challenge initiative which she joins in with. She previously committed to not eating processed food, and changed to a vegetarian diet, which she continued after Lent. She was very busy last Lent organising a Laudato Si' Lent Awareness Campaign and a Laudato Si' Lent Day in her parish, as well as presenting Laudato Si' Stations of the Cross online. She joinedwith several other Lenten activities as well! She encourages us to make our own poster display for Lent - see photos on next page 7,





Stephen agrees with the idea of Lent being about doing more. "Giving up our precious time for others can be penitential, but so often brings unexpected spiritual benefits". He sees giving up treats as "an opportunity to give more resources to others", which is making something negative into something positive. Like Susan, he thinks it's important to find out how ethical the brands we buy are; he subscribes to Ethical Consumer magazine, and advises googling the name of a product or company followed by ownership.

I would recommend also, before buying a product, to google it adding the words 'ecologically friendly' to find the greenest version. David agrees with Stephen about positive thinking - "thinking in a positive way and creating awareness is the way to go". He also likes to add a spiritual exercise – in his case, the Stations of the Cross. Another spiritual exercise that he recommends is a nature walk, as a "helpful reflection on creation".


While Sean agrees with the tradition of almsgiving during Lent, and donates to various campaign and charity groups, he thinks Lent is also an opportunity to spend more time in prayer and discernment, for instance studying the Mass Readings. He prefers to think of resolutions as 'objectives', and to be realistic about them by using the SMART technique - Specific, Measurable, Accurate, Realistic, Time Related.

He sounds a smart man! Not like me. I would rashly make a commitment, then find to my astonishment that it is doable, the hardest part having turned out to be the decision to make the commitment.

One surprise from this survey is that no-one seems keen on fasting. Not only is fasting traditional in Lent, it can have positive health benefits. Still, it's not for me!

It seems to me that we Animators agree with each other in most ways – buying little, having a positive attitude when giving up things, continuing after Lent if we can, adding a spiritual activity. So, a mixture of the old and the new perhaps. It's typical of the Animators that the new embraces concern for the natural environment.





Marian Thompson writes: You may have noticed a few of these posters in windows near you. This is part of the Greenpeace pre- election campaign to encourage politicians to take the climate emergency seriously. You can read about it https://www.greenpeace.org.uk/take-action/project-climate-vote/
There are three ways you can get involved:

i. taking the pledge online

ii. telling others by talking to friends and if you get the chance politicians and by putting up a poster iii. joining a team to go out with others door knocking. Encouraged by members of Climate Action Marple (our local environmental group) I accepted this third challenge.

I have now been out twice. The first time I was a little nervous wondering what to expect. I had done the Greenpeace preparation zoom course a couple of evenings before but it is rather different meeting and talking face to face with strangers. We go in pairs to the individual houses and stay together as a group working in the same street. The idea is you engage people at the door with conversation about Climate Change. There are some suggested starter questions and if people show they are concerned, you ask if they will put up a poster in their window and as the General Election approaches be interested to receive by email information from Greenpeace about the local parliamentary candidates' attitudes to climate issues. Helen our group leader had planned streets we would visit where there is a good footfall to see any posters that are put up.

During the six hours we were out, we knocked on 205 doors, had 58 concverstaions and signed up 27 climate voters.

Both times we seemed to knock on a large number of doors where people were out or chose not to answer so we pushed an information card through to say we had been. But both times some people were willing even eager to talk and I enjoyed the very varied conversations from 'not bothered about climate change' to 'very concerned and pleased to do something'. Also some people who answer positively to the opening question 'Are you concerend about the climate and our environment' then, during our conversation, explained why they cannot put up a poster. 'I have worked in the oil industry all my life (maybe 30 years?) and am afraid for my job' 'My concerns about the NHS which will affect the way I vote' 'Although I am concerned I don't think politicians will ever listen'. 'My husband will not have anything in the window...not even a Labour poster!'

We hope to continue this on a monthly basis until an election is called and hopefully there maybe more and more posters appearing. It seems to be a positive way to engage with local people about the climate emergency.

CITIZENSUK Lancashire Citizens and Voter Registration Champions

Community Organising has a long history in creating change in civic society and with regards to social justice; and was influential in both the suffragette and Civil Rights Movements. Through the development and application of this method Citizens Alliances have developed across the UK, including Lancashire Citizens, to create lasting and tangible change within some of the poorest and most marginalized communities in the country. For Example, the Real Living Wage campaign and making misogyny as a hate crime was developed through community organising methods in the UK.



Citizens UK's mission is to build the capacity of the people to participate in public life, to act together for the common good, to win change and to strengthen civic institutions in the process. We aim to

develop leaders and effective citizens, strengthen civic institutions, and create systemic change. We achieve this by building a broad and diverse alliance of civil society institutions (faith, community, and education) in a Chapter. Lancashire Citizens are in the developmental and growth stage of establishing a diverse and strong alliance of institutions across the county. As we develop this alliance, we will begin to hold thousands of conversations across the County to find out what is of greatest concern to residents.

As part of the development of the Lancashire Chapter we have recently held some online webinars to understand the relationship between different faiths and institutions and community organising. We welcomed a range of leaders from around the UK, such as Sir John Battle and Fr Chris Hughes, to share with us their learning and experiences. We also met key leaders from the URC, Methodists, and Salvation Army. This was the start of a series of webinars that we will be having in Lancashire and training sessions about community organising over the next 12 months. In Lancashire on 26 November 2023, a level 2 Devolution proposal and consultation period was announced. This aims to give communities and local authorities some autonomy on how to spend budget and deliver services such as transport. There is no better time to actively encourage local people to become active in civil society to make change for the common good and social justice. The people of Lancashire need to be able to feel involved and heard throughout the changes and events that occur over the coming months and years. They need to be offered a safe, structured, and supportive method in which to do so; community organising, and Citizens UK have a 30-year history of developing leaders through their methods and training. By building on our experience of accrediting a range of organisation's across the country with the Real living wage we are pleased to be able to apply this to the voter registration scheme and we need Voter Registration Champions!

As I am sure you are all aware, there will be a general election in the UK by January 2025. Research from the Electoral Commission suggests:

- 8 million eligible voters may not vote at the next General Election because they didn't register to vote in time.
- 4 million eligible voters may not vote at the next General Election because they do not have appropriate Photo ID;
- 14 million eligible voters may not vote at the next General Election because they are not motivated to turn out to vote on election day.
- You are at greater risk of not being able to participate in the democratic process if you are: young, a non -UK national, rent your home, have moved recently, live in an economically - disadvantaged community, or are from an ethnic minority. (Source: Electoral Commission – 2023 Report: Electoral Registers in the UK)

All of this highlights the need for democratic education, especially with regards to understanding the need to be registered for voting correctly. Your church, school or organisation can help local people, including your staff, services users, congregation, students and parents or members to understand the requirements of voter registration and assisting them in doing so.



So what does becoming a voter registration Champion mean? There are many ways in which you can support local people to register and vote...this is completely non-partisan... who they vote for is up to the individual, but they might need support or advice in understanding how to vote or why voting is important. You could:

- Run an annual Voter Registration campaign that aims to ensure that 100% of your organisation's eligible membership are registered before the deadline (with a 90% success rate).
- Educate your members about the Voter ID requirements, and make sure they have the photo ID they need in order to vote before the deadline.
- Remind your members about the election date and encourage them to use

their vote

• **VOTER REGISTRATION WEEK (MARCH 4th -10th 2024):** Help build the movement by participating in Voter Registration Week activities.

Signpost for Social Prescribing in Lancashire Churches- an NHS funded Digital Catalogue

Churches Together in Lancashire is working with the Lancashire County Council and wider healthcare systems to create a directory of care and community services that take place in churches. If you run a coffee morning, lunch club, activities for families and children, debt or addiction advice, anything that supports community health and being, then please get in touch. The "Digital Catalogue" is an NHS initiative to collect and maintain information that can be accessed by local people, and useable by frontline workers as well as wider volunteers and workers inside the Voluntary, Faith and Social Enterprise sectors (VCFSE).

Working with the 'faith sector'

Since the pandemic, there has been a discernible change in the attitude of public sector partners to work with the 'faith sector' (the "F" in the VCFSE – voluntary, community and faith sector), and there are a whole range of levels where members of faith groups can secure representation. The CVS (community and voluntary support), of which there are branches in East Lancashire, Hyndburn and in Lancaster, is a good infrastructure body to be part of, and simply requires a church / faith group to complete an application form.

At a district level, the newly formed Family Hub Networks are holding monthly 'partnership' meetings, at which representation from church / faith groups would be welcome, and provide a great opportunity for developing relationships. Again and again staff here, and in the health service, profess a desire to work with the faith sector, but confess an ignorance of who to make contact with. So, why not be pro-active and initiate these contacts ourselves.

ISRAEL /PALESTINE

Do you know the difference between UNRWA and UNHCR?

In the wake of several large donors withdrawing their support for UNRWA recently, Jonathan Cook examines the history of the organisation. He writes on X (formerly Twitter):

'UNRWA (The United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East pronounced UN-rə) is separate from the UN's main refugee agency, the UNHCR, and deals only with Palestinian refugees. Although Israel does not want you to know it, the reason for there being two UN refugee agencies is because Israel and its western backers insisted on the division back in 1948.

Why? Because Israel was afraid of the Palestinians falling under the responsibility of the UNHCR's forerunner, the International Refugee Organisation. The IRO was established in the immediate wake of the Second World War in large part to cope with the millions of European Jews fleeing Nazi atrocities.

Israel did not want the two cases treated as comparable, because it was pushing hard for Jewish refugees to be settled on lands from which it had just expelled Palestinians. Part of the IRO's mission was to seek the repatriation of European Jews. Israel was worried that very principle might be used both to deny it the Jews it wanted to colonise Palestinian land and to force it to allow the Palestinian refugees to return to their former homes.'

DEMILITARISING THE UNIVERSITIES

UK universities are accepting money from the military and defence sector, building research around arms-trade needs, while also buying shares in arms companies and profiting from those shares. The UK government sees major advantage in hosting weapons-related research in universities, seeing arms development as falling in line with its economic and national security agendas. Research which could fuel peaceful, sustainable innovation can easily be crowded out, particularly given that defence

research has more links to security policy making than research on human security. The truth is, our security relies on the health of the planet and people, not on the health of our militaries, and military spending is not based on a sound analysis of national security.

We, at Demilitarise Education, say that this research and these partnerships jeopardise what a university should seek to do. Instead of selling their research capabilities to arms companies, universities should broaden the minds of their students, working to produce knowledge that improves the health, wellbeing, and security of the world.

COUNTING THE COST OF CLIMATE CHANGE

A new analysis of the top 20 costliest extreme climate disasters over 2023 has revealed a "global postcode lottery stacked against the poor" where the relative economic impact of disasters varies considerably across countries.

Christian Aid, which published the analysis in their report Counting the Cost 2023: A year of climate breakdown, warns "more climate finance is desperately needed" including investment in early warning and early action.

The top 20 list of the costliest extreme disasters of 2023 across a range of 14 countries shows that some countries - through size, geography, or other factors - are more prone to experience disasters.
